

## IN MEMORIAM

Head Quarters, Second Brigade, Virginia Division U. C. V. Ivanhoe Va., Feb. 15, 1914. Special order No. 3.

It is with the deepest sorrow that the Brigadier General commanding the second Brigade Va., Div., U. C. V. announces the death of Major Charles Lewis Price, chief of ordinances on the Brigade Staff.

Major Price was born in Giles county Va., June 6, 1843 and died at his home, The Commercial House, at Ivanhoe, Va., at six p. m. March 9th, 1914, after a brief illness, in the 71st year of his age, attended by all of his family, except Mrs. L. L. Morris of Knoxville, Tennessee, who was absent on account of sickness in her own family.

Major Price enlisted in Co. K. 36 Va. Infantry early in the war between the states and was orderly sergeant of that company. He was a gallant soldier, good citizen and a devoted family man and friend. His wife, who was a Miss Mitchell, preceded him to the grave, by about nine months.

The sincere and heartfelt sympathy and condolence of the Brigade is hereby tendered to his bereaved and grief stricken family in their deep affliction.

Commanders and Adjutants of the Camps composing the Second Brigade will cause this special order No. 3 to be read to the camps and spread upon the minutes at the next meeting, as a memorial of our deceased worthy and beloved comrade. By order of

## Col. Price Succumbs to Paralysis

There was widespread sorrow in Ivanhoe and in the South West over the death of Charles Lewis Price, one of the oldest and most highly esteemed, and best beloved citizens of Ivanhoe, who succumbed Monday evening at six o'clock at this home in Ivanhoe. He was 70 years old, a member of Iva Lodge No. 173, L. O. O. F. Major and Chief of Ordinance on Staff of second Brigade, Virginia Division, U. C. V. and first lieutenant, Commandant of Ivanhoe Camp No. 107, U. C. V.

He is survived by one son, M. M. Price, of Ivanhoe, Va., three daughters, Mrs. L. L. Morris, of Knoxville, Tenn., Mrs. J. K. Painter, of Johnson City, Tenn., Mrs. F. T. Duncan, of Coalwood, W. Va., and one sister, Mrs. H. B. Echols, of Roanoke, Virginia.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist church Wednesday morning at ten thirty o'clock by Rev. J. R. Walker. There was an unusually large crowd in attendance thus proving the respect in which the deceased was held.

The active pall bearers were Messrs. G. F. Bralley, Josiah Williams, W. A. Vaughan, L. E. Painter, J. M. Moony and Dr. M. W. Jewett, dressed in full Confederate Uniforms. The honorary pall bearers were the members of the I. O. O. F. Lodge of Ivanhoe.

Charles Lewis Price was born in Giles Co., Va., June 9, 1843 and was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Price. He was married in 1868 to Miss Emilie Mitchell, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Zachariah Mitchell, of Wythe Co. Mrs. Price preceded him some nine months, her death occurring June 5, 1913.
