

# The Cook Family of Lawrenceburg, Indiana

## First Generation

**William Cook** was born between 1761 and 1770 in Virginia and died in February or March 1837 in Dearborn County, Indiana. He was married to **Alice** — ?—, who was born between 1771 and 1775 in Virginia and died between 1830 and 1837 probably in Dearborn County, Indiana.

**W**ILLIAM MAY BE TRACED TO ROMNEY, HAMPSHIRE COUNTY, VIRGINIA, in the 1790s based on his children's reported place of birth. The sole Cook appearing in Sage and Jones' *Early Records, Hampshire County, Virginia, Now West Virginia* for that time period is indeed a William and is married to an Alice, whom I take to be the mother of his children.

On 25 July 1795 the trustees of Romney granted this William a half-acre in the town of Romney,<sup>1</sup> which he later sold on 14 April 1797 to a Francis White.<sup>2</sup> He was also witness to a few land transactions: on 16 October 1797, of John and Mary Prunty to John Brown;<sup>3</sup> on 17 September 1798, of John and Mary Hansbrough to Edward Dyer;<sup>4</sup> and on 14 November 1798, of Thomas Kirk to Edward Dyer.<sup>5</sup> On 17 September 1798 he also was appointed surveyor of the road from Romney to Little Cacapon (replacing Thomas Mullyedy).<sup>6</sup> On 15 April 1799 the trustees of Romney granted William another half-acre in Romney,<sup>7</sup> and on the following 16 December he was replaced as road overseer by Elijah Gaither.<sup>8</sup> On 19 May 1800 he had another unspecified land transaction to Francis White,<sup>9</sup> and on 13 September 1802 he was delivered a land grant on Cacapon Mountain along the Cacapon River in Hampshire County.<sup>10</sup>

Sometime before 1806 William moved his family to Lawrenceburg, Dearborn County, Indiana Territory, and took up the position of jailer for the first jail in the county, which was also the family's residence—a log-built structure which had been erected on the public square two years previous.<sup>11</sup> In 1810 the county's first courthouse was built and with it a new jail—a two-story stone structure that presumably also served as the Cook family home.<sup>12</sup>

William's name appears on a petition to Congress dated 13 February 1806 by the citizens of Dearborn County seeking the establishment of a post road for mail delivery;<sup>13</sup> an 1807 census of males over twenty-one years of age in the county;<sup>14</sup> a 3 August 1812 list of electors participating in an election held at the house of Jacob Horner;<sup>15</sup> the federal census of Lawrenceburg taken in 1820<sup>16</sup> and of Lawrenceburg Township in 1830;<sup>17</sup> a notice dated 1 April 1834 for individuals with letters remaining in the post office at Lawrenceburg;<sup>18</sup> and a 2 June 1835 petition of citizens urging the city council not to donate any money to the Lawrenceburg & Indianapolis Railroad Company for construction of a railroad embankment in Lawrenceville until a survey was completed and a cost estimate filed.<sup>19</sup>

In 1835 the county seat was moved from Lawrenceburg to Wilmington, Hogan Township, and with it the courthouse and jail. This third county jail was soon destroyed by fire and then replaced by a new structure on the village's public square.<sup>20</sup> That William was still working as jailer as late as September 1835, when \$21.87 was allowed him by the county commissioner for keeping and attending prisoners, suggests that he may have moved to Wilmington when the new jail was constructed.<sup>21</sup> However, at the writing of his will on 8 February 1837 he was a resident of Lawrenceburg, in possession of in-lot forty-nine at Main and High Streets.<sup>22</sup> The will mentions all of the children listed below but not a wife, so Alice must have been dead by that point. William died sometime between the writing of the will and its probate on 22 March 1837.<sup>23</sup>

William and Alice had the following children:

## Second Generation

1            **Ulysses Cook**, son of William and Alice (—?—) Cook, was born between 1791 and 1794 probably in Romney, Hampshire County, Virginia, and died after 1837. He was married before 1810 to —?—, who was born between 1791 and 1794 and died after 1830.

**U**LYSSES WAS AMONG THOSE REMEMBERED as settlers of Dearborn County, Indiana Territory, before the War of 1812, locating on a farm on the hill in

sight of Lawrenceburg.<sup>24</sup> His name appears on a petition to the House of Representatives dated 22 January 1811 by the citizens of Dearborn County seeking to extend the line of post offices and post roads from Lawrenceburg throughout the counties of Franklin and Wayne that had recently been formed out of the north part of Dearborn;<sup>25</sup> the 1820 federal census of Lawrenceburg;<sup>26</sup> the list of officers at the first available record of meeting of the Free and Accepted Masons in the county on 21 March 1826 naming him senior warden;<sup>27</sup> a list of those present on 25 June 1827 at a St. John's Day celebration at the masons' lodge;<sup>28</sup> and the 1830 federal census of Lawrenceburg Township.<sup>29</sup> That same year he was elected a new member of Board of Magistrates for Dearborn County.<sup>30</sup> After being mentioned in his father's will of 1837 he disappears from the historical record.

Ulysses and —?— had the following children:

- 1.8 —?— **Cook**, a daughter, who was born between 1826 and 1830 and died after 1830.

2 **Theodosia Cook**, daughter of William and Alice (—?—) Cook, was born on 3 February 1793 probably in Romney, Hampshire County, Virginia,<sup>31</sup> and died on 22 March 1843.<sup>32</sup> She was married on 3 February 1813<sup>33</sup> to **Robert Walker**, who was born on 7 August 1779 in County Tyrone, Ulster, Ireland,<sup>34</sup> and died on 7 August 1865 probably in Wilmington, Hogan Township, Dearborn County, Indiana.<sup>35</sup>

**R**OBERT "IMMIGRATED TO THIS COUNTRY WHEN A YOUNG MAN and finally drifted to Dearborn county,"<sup>36</sup> stopping in 1807 at Lawrenceburg.<sup>37</sup> His name appears on a 3 August 1812 list of electors participating in an election held at the house of Jacob Horner<sup>38</sup> and a notice dated 30 December 1824 for individuals with letters remaining in the post office at Lawrenceburg.<sup>39</sup>

Theodosia and Robert settled on a farm on the hill near Mount Tabor in the portion of Laughery Township that is now Washington Township.<sup>40</sup> They were members of the Methodist Episcopal Church.<sup>41</sup>

After Theodosia's death Robert was married, second, before 1850 to Christiana —?—. In 1850 they were still in Laughery Township, working a farm worth \$700.<sup>42</sup> Robert was married, third, before 1860 to Margaret —?—. He moved before 1860 to a farm on Hogan Creek in Wilmington.<sup>43</sup> In 1860 this farm was valued at \$300 and Robert owned an additional \$300 in personal property.<sup>44</sup>

Theodosia and Robert were buried in Mount Tabor Church Cemetery, Washington Township, Dearborn County, Indiana.<sup>45</sup>

Theodosia and Robert had the following children:

- + 2.9 **Thomas James Walker**, born on 4 December 1831, died on 5 January 1918.

**3 John W. H. Cook Cook**, son of William and Alice (—?—) Cook, was born about 1795 probably in Romney, Hampshire County, Virginia, and died after 1864 probably in Anamosa, Jones County, Iowa. He was married, first, before 1818 to **Lovis Pate**, daughter of Adam and —?— (—?—) Pate, who was born between 1801 and 1804 probably in Montgomery County, Virginia, and died between 1848 and 1850 probably in Linn County, Iowa. John was married, second, on 17 January 1850 in Jones County, Iowa,<sup>46</sup> to **Lydia (Devore) Herron**, daughter of Elijah and Barbary (—?—) Devore, who was born on 11 June 1800 Pennsylvania and died of typhoid fever on 1 October 1879 in Linn County, Iowa.

**T**HE CENSUSES OF 1820 AND 1830 SHOW JOHN farming in Manchester Township, Dearborn County, Indiana,<sup>47</sup> and by the time of the census of 1840 he had moved his family to a farm in Franklin County, Indiana.<sup>48</sup>

In about 1848 John brought his family to Iowa,<sup>49</sup> where on 1 February 1848 a "Lowvisa Cook" was granted a forty acre parcel in the southwest quarter of the southwest quarter of section 29, Township 86 North Range 5 West, in Linn County,<sup>50</sup> and on 1 March 1848 John was granted a forty acre parcel in the southeast quarter of the northwest quarter of section 29, Township 84 North Range 5 West, in Linn County.<sup>51</sup> The 1850 census shows John and "Laven" living near Lovis' brother Henry Pate on a farm Linn County, Iowa, worth \$350.<sup>52</sup> The agriculture schedule of that year provides the further details that their farm consisted of thirty acres of improved and twenty acres of unimproved land; that

within the previous year they owned one milch cow and seven swine, worth a total of \$19; and that within the previous year they produced 100 bushels of wheat, 300 bushels of Indian corn, 10 tons of hay, and slaughtered livestock valued at \$60.<sup>53</sup>

By 1852 the family had moved to Cass Township,<sup>54</sup> and by 1854, Fairview Township, both in Jones County, Iowa.<sup>55</sup> Lydia appears to have separated from John by 1854, as his household in the census of that year appears to consist solely of himself and his minor children. The next year, John declared himself unable to support his children George and Mary.<sup>56</sup> In 1856, with George and Mary under the care of their sister Maria, John was living with his son William's family and working as a laborer.<sup>57</sup>

On 20 September 1862 John, a resident of Anamosa, Jones County, Iowa, enlisted as a private with Company I, 37<sup>th</sup> Iowa Infantry, with brother-in-law Henry Pate joining him two days later.<sup>58</sup> According to the *Roster and Record of Iowa Soldiers in the War of the Rebellion*,

The Thirty-seventh Regiment of Iowa Volunteer Infantry occupies a distinct and unique position in the history of the great War of the Rebellion. It was composed exclusively of men who were exempt from the obligations of military duty. From the date of its organization, it came to be generally known and designated as the "Graybeard Regiment." Special authority was obtained from the Secretary of War to organize one regiment, composed of men who were over forty-five years of age, but who were in good physical condition, and therefore able to perform the duty of soldiers. It was understood, however, the regiment was to be assigned to guard and garrison duty, and was not to be put upon active service in the field, except in the event of an emergency that would justify its being ordered to perform such service.<sup>59</sup>

On 10 October 1862 John and Henry were ordered to the quarters at Camp Strong near Muscatine, Muscatine County, Iowa, and were there mustered into service on the following 19 November.<sup>60</sup> The *Roster and Record* continues,

During the interval, from the time the companies had assembled at the rendezvous and the departure of the regiment from the State, the officers and men had acquired a fair knowledge of their duties as soldiers. They were a vigorous and sturdy body of old men, and were as ready and anxious for the work before them as the younger men, of the regiments which had preceded them, had been.

The regiment was ordered to proceed to St. Louis, where it arrived on January 1, 1863, and attracted marked attention by its soldierly bearing, as it marched through the streets of the city to Benton Barracks, where it remained until January 5<sup>th</sup>, when it was assigned to the duty of guarding the rebel prisoners confined in the two military prisons, with headquarters of the regiment and quarters for the officers and men located in Schofield Barracks. In addition to the duty of guarding the prisoners, the regiment had one company on provost guard duty in the city. These duties were discharged with great fidelity and to the satisfaction of the General commanding the Department of Missouri, whose headquarters were in the city. In the month of April, 1863, the rebel Generals, Price and Van Dorn, having invaded the State of Missouri with a large force,

were threatening to march upon St. Louis, and six companies of the Thirty-seventh Iowa were placed on duty at the Arsenal, where an immense quantity of ordnance stores had been accumulated. When the rebel forces had been met and repulsed by the Union forces sent against them, and were being driven out of the State, the six companies were relieved from duty at the Arsenal, and the entire regiment was ordered to go upon guard duty along the line of the Pacific Railroad, west of St. Louis. The headquarters of the regiment were established at Franklin, Mo., and detachments were stationed at different points along the line of the road, from St. Louis to Jefferson City.<sup>61</sup>

John may or may not have been involved in this second round of guard duty; it began on 1 May but on 7 May John was discharged for disability at St. Louis, with Henry receiving his own disability discharge the next day.<sup>62</sup>

John's date of death is unknown but must have occurred after 29 February 1864 when he filed invalid pension application no. 41,436 for his military service.<sup>63</sup> John was buried in Riverside Cemetery, Anamosa, Jones County, Iowa.<sup>64</sup>

John and Lovis had the following children:

- + 3.1 **Maria Cook**, born about 1818, died on 28 December 1907.
- + 3.2 **Nancy Cook**, born in October 1819.
- + 3.3 **William Cook**, born on 4 October 1822, died on died on 5 or 7 May 1896.
- 3.4 —?— **Cook**, a daughter, who was born between 1826 and 1830, as represented in the censuses of 1830 and 1840.<sup>65</sup>
- + 3.5 **Amster B. Cook**, born in January 1827, died on 4 December 1904.
- 3.6 **Solomon Cook**, who was born about 1831 probably in Manchester Township, Dearborn County, Indiana.  
Solomon was probably counted in his father's household in the 1840 census of Franklin County, Indiana.<sup>66</sup> In 1850 he was living with sister Maria's family in Fairview Township, Jones County, Iowa, where he attended school and worked as a carpenter with Maria's husband Harmon.<sup>67</sup> No further record.
- 3.7 —?— **Cook**, a daughter, who was born between 1831 and 1835, as represented in the census of 1840.<sup>68</sup>
- 3.8 —?— **Cook**, a daughter, who was born between 1831 and 1835, as represented in the census of 1840.<sup>69</sup>
- 3.9 **Theodosia Cook**, who was born about 1837 in Indiana.  
Theodosia was probably counted in her father's household in the 1840 census of Franklin County, Indiana.<sup>70</sup> In 1850 she was living with her parents in Linn County, Iowa, where she attended school.<sup>71</sup> She was probably in her father's household in 1852 in Cass Township, Jones County, Iowa.<sup>72</sup> No further record.
- 3.10 **John H. Cook**, who was born about 1837 in Indiana and died on 4 September 1858.<sup>73</sup>

John was probably counted in his father's household in the 1840 census of Franklin County, Indiana.<sup>74</sup> In 1850 he was living

with his parents in Linn County, Iowa, where he attended school.<sup>75</sup> He was probably in his father's household in 1852 in Cass Township, Jones County, Iowa.<sup>76</sup> John was buried in Riverside Cemetery, Anamosa, Jones County, Iowa.<sup>77</sup>

+ 3.11 **George Washington Alexander Cook**, born on 3 March 1841 or 1842, died on 15 or 18 July 1939.

3.12 **Mary Letty Cook**, who was born about 1844–5 in Indiana.

In 1850 Mary was living with her parents in Linn County, Iowa, where she attended school.<sup>78</sup> She was probably in her father's household in 1852 in Cass Township, Jones County, Iowa,<sup>79</sup> and in 1854 in Fairview Township, Jones County, Iowa.<sup>80</sup> In 1856 and 1860 she was living with her sister Maria's family in Fairview Township, where she attended school and worked as a servant.<sup>81</sup> No further record.

4 **Lavina Cook**, daughter of William and Alice (—?—) Cook, was born on 26 September 1798 in Romney, Hampshire County, Virginia,<sup>82</sup> and died on 19 November 1862 in New Albany, Floyd County, Indiana.<sup>83</sup> She was married, first, on 4 August 1818 probably in Dearborn County, Indiana,<sup>84</sup> to **John Chandler**, who was born on 4 January 1796 in Virginia,<sup>85</sup> and died in April 1826 probably in Dearborn County, Indiana.<sup>86</sup> Lavina was married, second, on 10 July 1833 in Dearborn County, Indiana,<sup>87</sup> to **Samuel Elliott**, who was born about 1776<sup>88</sup> probably in New Hampshire and died on 28 September 1834<sup>89</sup> probably in Dearborn County, Indiana.

**I**N 1820 LAVINA WAS LIVING IN LAWRENCEBURG with John Chandler, who was then engaged in manufacturing.<sup>90</sup> The recently widowed Lavina and her children may account for the large size of her father's household in the census of 1830, although the ages of her children don't quite match those on the census.

Samuel had been married, first, on 1 June 1797 in Boscawen, Merrimack County, New Hampshire,<sup>91</sup> to Mary "Polly" Gookin. In 1800 he was living in Boscawen,<sup>92</sup> but must have moved shortly thereafter to Dearborn County, Indiana. His name appear on an 1805 indenture binding one James Smith as an apprentice cooper to himself for a period of two years;<sup>93</sup> a petition to Congress dated 13 February 1806 by the citizens of Dearborn County seeking the establishment of a post road for mail delivery;<sup>94</sup> and an 1815 broadside listing for sale the following:

100 acres of farm and timber land on the Blackwater River in the south part of Boscawen; a house, barn, and orchard on ten acres of land on the road from Corserhill to Warner; [and] four good working oxen.<sup>95</sup>

The census of 1830 shows him living in Lawrenceburg Township with only a male of fifteen to twenty years of age, suggesting that Polly was not with him.<sup>96</sup> In 1832 Samuel purchased land in section 30, Township 6 Range 1 West, in Miller Township, Dearborn County, Indiana.<sup>97</sup> He may have associated with the Baptist Church, as he and Lavina were married by Ezra Ferris, a Baptist minister.<sup>98</sup>

Samuel was buried in Greendale Cemetery, Greendale, Dearborn County, Indiana.<sup>99</sup> At the time of his death Samuel was in debt and his estate was declared insolvent, but he was legal owner of several lots in the town of Lawrenceburg, which were sold to pay off his creditors.<sup>100</sup> Lavina may have been surprised to discover that Samuel had a wife still living back in New Hampshire, declared to have been insane for many years, who on 23 November 1843 filed a petition claiming her right as widow to a portion of Samuel's estate.<sup>101</sup>

The census of 1840 shows Lavina Elliott as head-of-household with her children in Dearborn County.<sup>102</sup> In 1850 she was living in Lawrenceburg with her son Sylvester,<sup>103</sup> and in 1860 with her daughter Catherine's family and grandson Levi Culver in the household of cooper Henry Harmon in New Albany Ward 1, Floyd County, Indiana.<sup>104</sup>

Lavina and John had the following children:

- + 4.1 **Sylvester Robinson Chandler**, born on 1 July 1819, died before 1870.
- + 4.2 **Frances Louiza Chandler**, born on 24 February 1821, died on 13 April 1843.
- + 4.3 **George Thomas Chandler**, born on 26 November 1822, died in 1892.
- + 4.4 **Mary Jane Chandler**, born on 11 January 1825, died on 9 February 1887.

Lavina and Samuel had the following children:

- + 4.5 **Catherine A. Elliott**, born on 31 August 1834, died on 2 January 1922.

5 **Sylvester Cook**, son of William and Alice (—?—) Cook, was born between 1791 and 1800 probably in Romney, Hampshire County, Virginia, and died after 1837. He was married on 19 February 1827 in Dearborn County, Indiana,<sup>105</sup> to **Lydia Stevenson**, daughter of Andrew Stevenson and Tabitha Dolph, who was born between 1801 and 1810 and died after 1830.

AFTER BEING COUNTED IN THE 1830 FEDERAL CENSUS of Lawrenceburg Township, Dearborn County, Indiana,<sup>106</sup> and being mentioned in his father's will of 1837, Sylvester disappears from the historical record. He may be the single carpenter of the same name listed in the 1850 federal census of Louisville District 3, Jefferson County, Kentucky, although this individual gives a birthplace of Kentucky and the age is difficult to read—either "30" or "50."<sup>107</sup>

Sylvester and Lydia had at least the following child:

- 5.1 —?— **Cook**, a daughter, who was born between 1826 and 1830 and died after 1830.



6 **Anna “Annie” Cook**, daughter of William and Alice (—?—) Cook, was born about 1802–4 in Romney, Hampshire County, Virginia,<sup>108</sup> and died of old age on 21 February 1899 probably in Louisville, Jefferson County, Kentucky.<sup>109</sup> She was married, first, before 1837, to —?— **Teney**. Annie was married, second, after 1837 to —?— **Klein**. Annie was married, third, on 1 June 1858 in St. Louis (independent city), Missouri,<sup>110</sup> to **Stafford McGee**, son of Samuel and Martha (Stafford) McGee, who was born about 1796 in Kentucky and died in 1859 probably in St. Louis.<sup>111</sup>

**L**OUISVILLE CITY DIRECTORIES CALL ANNIE the widow of a Stafford McGee; assuming she is the “Mrs. Ann Klein” who married a Stafford McGee in St. Louis, she must have made her way to that city with her second husband before 1858. On 30 May 1859 Annie relinquished her right to administer in Stafford’s estate but went on to receive a total of \$212.70 as his widow, which included “the amount of proceeds of sale of a kitchen table, kitchen stove, bedstead & dining room chair, to which I was entitled, or my absolute property as widow & which was sold by the administrator by mistake.”<sup>112</sup>

Though she continued receiving portions of her inheritance from Stafford in St. Louis until the final payment on 8 March 1861, the 1860 federal census shows that by that time she had moved to Louisville. She resided that year in the household of stage driver Cornelius Brewster;<sup>113</sup> in 1869–72 with her sister Eliza at 292 Montgomery Street;<sup>114</sup> in 1875 at 22½ Market Street;<sup>115</sup> in 1879–81 with Eliza back at 292 Montgomery Street;<sup>116</sup> in 1883 at 636 3<sup>rd</sup> Street;<sup>117</sup> in 1885 with Eliza at 3531 Rudd Avenue;<sup>118</sup> in 1886 with Eliza at 320 4<sup>th</sup> Street;<sup>119</sup> in 1887–89 (with Eliza in 1888) back at 636 3<sup>rd</sup> Street;<sup>120</sup> in 1890 at 331 East St. Catherine Street;<sup>121</sup> in 1891 with Eliza at 3606 High Avenue;<sup>122</sup> in 1892 back at 331 East St. Catherine Street;<sup>123</sup> in 1893 at 626 3<sup>rd</sup> Street;<sup>124</sup> in 1894 at 913 1<sup>st</sup> Street;<sup>125</sup> and from 1895 to her death back again at 331 East St. Catherine Street.<sup>126</sup>

Annie was buried on 22 February 1899 in Cave Hill Cemetery, Louisville, Jefferson County, Kentucky.<sup>127</sup>

7 **Eliza B. Cook**, son of William and Alice (—?—) Cook, was born about 1808 or 1820 in Lawrenceburg, Dearborn County, Indiana Territory,<sup>128</sup> and died of remittent fever on 27 October 1891 probably in Louisville, Jefferson County, Kentucky.<sup>129</sup> She was married on 7 February 1843 in Dearborn County, Indiana,<sup>130</sup> to **William B. June**, who died before 1867.

**W**ILLIAM APPEARS ON THE SLAVE SCHEDULE of the 1850 federal census of Louisville District 2 as the owner of one eighteen-year-old black female slave.<sup>131</sup> William must have died before 1867, when Eliza begins appearing in Louisville city directories as a widow. Eliza resided in 1867–8 at 761 Main Street;<sup>132</sup> in 1870–2 with her sister Annie at 292 Montgomery Street;<sup>133</sup> in 1877 at 515 3<sup>rd</sup> Street;<sup>134</sup> in 1879–81 with Annie back at 292 Montgomery Street (where she ran a boarding house);<sup>135</sup> in 1883 at 3722 Rudd Avenue;<sup>136</sup> in 1885 with Annie at 3531 Rudd Avenue;<sup>137</sup> in 1886 with Annie at 320 4<sup>th</sup> Street;<sup>138</sup> in

1888 with Annie at 636 3<sup>rd</sup> Street;<sup>139</sup> in 1889 at 725 12<sup>th</sup> Street;<sup>140</sup> and in 1891 with Annie at 3606 High Avenue.<sup>141</sup>

Eliza was buried on 28 October 1891 in Cave Hill Cemetery, Louisville, Jefferson County, Kentucky.<sup>142</sup>
