

Died in the Harness

John Murray of Mapleton met the last mortal call without a moments warning on the 20th inst., at Park City, where he was tending to an engine for a mining company.

Apoplexy is said to have been the cause of his death.

The departed was born in Switzerland April 1, 1864, and when ten years of age he came to Utah with his mother and settled Midway, Wasatch County, where he grew to manhood. At an early age he went to the mines and became an expert engineer, at which trade he labored for many years.

About twelve years ago he purchased a little ranch in Mapleton [Utah] which he improved summers and labored at the mines winters.

He was known as an industrious man, whose word was as good as his bond, a man who could be depended on to do the "square thing" in all his dealings. He was a member of the K.O.T.M and carried a nice sum of insurance.

Sunday afternoon a large audience assembled at Mapleton for the observance of the funeral rites. Bp. Wm T. Tew and Elder F. M. Snow were the speakers. The choir sang, "Oh, Grave Where is Thy Victory" and "Jesus My Savior."

A wife, four boys and one sister survive.
