- 27 Feb 1852 Received orders from Major General Daniel H. Wells to reorganize the Nauvoo Brass Band as Col. Duzette

- 12 Apr 1852 Appointed Major and Chief of Music for reorganized Nauvoo Legion in SLC

- 25 Oct 1857 Along with brother-in-law Lewis Robison and Joshua Terry carried letters from Governor Brigham Young instructing George A. Smith and his troops to turn back from a confrontation with federal troops
