[Important note: Maria Ann Tripp's birth date in this divorce petition is given as August 18, 1861, which is not correct. Her mother Eliza Reed was married and sealed to Nathaniel Vary Jones as his third wife on 27 March 1857 in the Endowment House in Salt Lake City. There is family tradition that this marriage may have been arranged by Brigham Young. Their daughter Maria Ann Jones was born two years later on 9 April 1859. In the Fall of 1859 Nathaniel was called to go to England on a mission, from which he returned in the Fall of 1861. While he was in England, Eliza was unhappy in the living conditions with the other wives. According to family tradition, Eliza complained to Brigham Young, and he granted her a divorce while Nathaniel was in England. Accordingly, there is no civil divorce record for Eliza and Nathaniel. Subsequently she married John Tripp, apparently in December 1860. As indicated in her divorce petition below, she was unhappy with Tripp as a provider. She left him in the gold fields near Virginia City, Montana, and returned with her daughter Maria to Salt Lake City, and filed for divorce. In her divorce petition, she states that Maria was her daughter from John Tripp, which was not true. Why would she say that? Perhaps she felt that if she disclosed her previous divorce from N.V. Jones, the judge may not look favorably upon her petition for divorce from John Tripp -- her second divorce within six years. Whatever her reasons may have been for stating in her divorce petition that Maria was her daughter from John Tripp, the 1860 Utah Census provides proof that Maria, age 1, was living with Eliza in the N.V. Jones household on 6 July 1860. At some point after Eliza returned from Montana to Salt Lake City, she asked the Colebrook family to take care of Maria, which they did until Maria married Ebenezer Young Taylor in the Logan Temple on 21 May 1884.]
