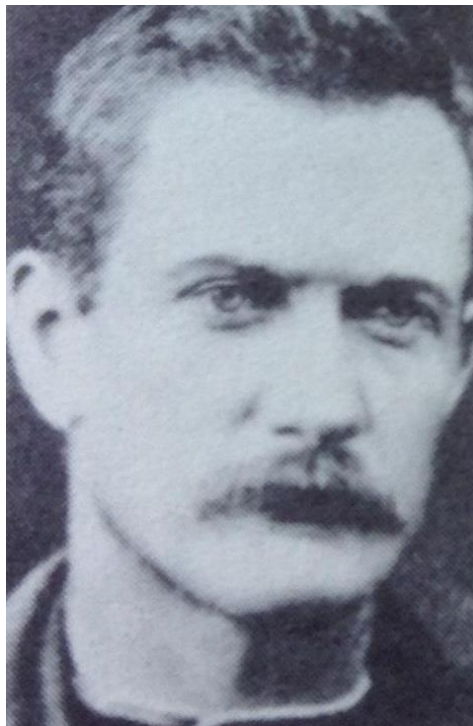


John Albert Huntington

John Albert Huntington was born 17 April 1853 in Springville, Utah, Utah Territory. He was the sixth of seven children of William Dresser Huntington and Caroline Clark. [His aunt was Zina D Huntington]. John's father had two other wives so John had seven half-siblings. In 1860, the family was living in San Bernardino City, San Bernardino, California, where his father was a carpenter.¹

On the 1880 census, John was a miner living in Silver Reef, Washington, Utah Territory.² He married Sarah Jane Banks later that year in Springville, Utah, Utah Territory.³ Two years later they moved to Orangeville, Emery, Utah Territory to farm. John was a carpenter and worked in a saw mill in the nearby mountains. He built them a log house and then a nice home.⁴

John was away, working at the saw mill, when he was stricken ill with pneumonia. After a short illness⁵, he died on 4 June 1896 and buried in Orangeville Cemetery.⁶ He was an honest, kind, and industrious man. He was a wonderful husband and dearly loved and respected by all who knew him.⁷ Sarah remarried in 1900 and had three more children. She lived in Spanish Fork⁸ until her death in 1930. She was buried in the Spanish Fork City Cemetery.⁹
