Simon Andrew McLaughlin, 80, resident of Payne county since 1889, died at his home in Ripley Wednesday. Death was attributed to heart disease.

Services will be held Friday at 2 p. m. in the Vincent Funeral chapel with Rev. Lesley McRill of Okla- homa City in charge. Burial will be in Fairlawn cemetery in Stillwater under the direction of the Vincent Funeral home.

McLaughlin was born in Cent- ralia, Kas., July 28, 1868, the son of William J. and Martha D. McLaughlin. He was married to Clara Ella Olinghouse in Tryon, Okla., December 18, 1898.

He came to Oklahoma in 1889 and settled near Tryon after mak- ing the run. He lived in Lincoln and Payne counties since that time. He was a member of the Modern Woodmen of America and was a retired farmer and railroad man.

Survivors include his wife of the home; three sons, Perry of Lovell, Orval of Ripley and William of Orlando; two daughters, Mrs. Bell Redman of Mulhall and Mrs. Beulah Berry of Cushing; 15 grand- children; four great grandchildren and a brother, Dadwin McLaughlin of Centralia.
